Ringtown #5, Raven Run #3, and Raven Run #2 and enters our state of the art Water Filtration Plant,

Skilled and Certified Treatment Plant operators monitor your water at the source, and test the water during

The treatment process and continue testing as the water flows throughout the distribution system

A Source Water Assessment of our source(s) was completed in 2002 by the PA Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP). The Assessment has found that our source(s) are potentially most susceptible to storm water runoff, accidental spills along roads and Erosion from illegal use of all terrain vehicles. Overall, our source(s) have little risk of significant contamination. Summary reports of the Assessment are available by writing to MASE P.O. ## MONITORING YOUR WATER:

### **DEFINITIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS:**

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)** - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant blow which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking

Mrem/year = millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body)

pCl/L = picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppb = parts per billion, or micrograms per liter
(µg/L)

ppm = parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/L)

ppq = parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter

ppt = parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

Total organic carbon (TOC) has no health effects. However, total organic carbon provides a medium for the formation of disinfection byproducts. These byproducts include trihalomethanes (THMs) and haloacetic acids (HAAs). Drinking water containing these byproducts in axcess of the MCL may lead to adverse health effects, liver or kidney problems, or nervous system effects and may lead to an increased risk of getting cancer.
